

**BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
REORGANIZATION MEETING
JANUARY 5, 2016**

At a reorganization meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Floyd County, Virginia, held on Tuesday, January 5, 2016 at 8:30 a.m. in the Board Room of the County Administration Building thereof;

PRESENT: Case C. Clinger, Chairman; Joe D. Turman, Vice Chairman; J. Fred Gerald, Linda Devito Kuchenbuch, Lauren D. Yoder, Board Members; Terri W. Morris, County Administrator; Cynthia Ryan, Assistant County Administrator.

The County Administrator called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. with the reading of the handicapping statement.

The Opening Prayer was led by Supervisor Gerald.

The County Administrator led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Administrator Morris called for nominations for Chairman for the 2016 calendar year.

Agenda Item 6 - Setting of date and time for regular meetings for calendar year 2016.

Chairman Clinger explained that there are a lot of other boards that Board of Supervisors members serve on and some of those meetings are on Thursdays, such as PSA.

Supervisor Turman said he serves on the Community Services Board which meets on Thursdays.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked what time does the mail get delivered on Monday?

Ms. Morris replied around 9:30 a.m. but it really doesn't make a difference to staff as to what day the meeting is held. For years and years the Board of Supervisors meeting was held on Mondays and the only trouble was that many holidays fall on a Monday. This would cause us to change the meeting dates.

Ms. Mara Eve Robbins, Courthouse District, offered the following comments and handed out information to all present.

Happy New Year everyone.

It's good to be here at the first meeting of 2016 and a pleasure to welcome our new board member, Linda Devito, to the table. I know that Linda will represent her constituents in the Little River District to the very best of her ability and will offer excellent leadership for Floyd County as a whole. Thank you for your service, Linda, and everyone else serving on the Board.

I come here today with a warning and an invitation. If you pay any attention to world news, then surely you've noticed that we're experiencing dramatic repercussions of climate chaos. Last week it was above freezing at the North Pole, causing accelerated melting of global ice caps. There are cataclysmic storms all over the world, including one back in the fall that profoundly affected Floyd County, causing loss of homes, roads, and bridges. You can witness the effects simply by looking at the weather over the last few weeks. We can only hope that the artificial spring created by one of the warmest Decembers in our history will not have a devastating effect on our crops, especially fruit trees. All of these alarming incidents – and many others – can be traced to climate disruption.

We simply cannot ignore the effects of our lifestyles any longer. Effective action begins at a local level. If we are not proactive about a solid plan to utilize clean, renewable energy we'll continue to contribute to the problem rather than offering innovative solutions. We're resourceful people here, a strong community with good ideas and the ability to work together effectively. I would like to propose that we create a series of Community Choice Agreements

that reflect our needs and intentions as a community. In this way, we can raise the standards and encourage our regional neighbors to do the same.

People here tend to seek a lifestyle that utilizes renewable energy in various forms and allows them to participate in the natural cycles of the seasons. But our seasons are changing as our world changes, thanks in part to our irresponsible utilization of fossil fuels. We need a viable plan to change that.

I have included copies of a fact sheet outlining one approach to this plan. I encourage you to educate yourself about our options so that you can effectively guide the citizens you represent. Please note, on page two, where it states that “most Virginians feel they lack the knowledge needed to make energy choices.” I trust that we can work together to create a knowledge base and a workable plan that encourages everyone in Floyd County to make wise decisions about the way in which they create, utilize and purchase energy.

I know that there are many people here in Floyd who not only agree that creating Community Choice Agreements is both necessary and wise, but also have a great deal to contribute to the ongoing dialogue.

I would like very much to invite you, our local government, to work with us to create a strategy that will carry us into the future as leaders in the movement to effectively address climate disruption, to mitigate global warming, and to fight for the health of not only our citizens but of our land as well. I truly believe that we can do so in a way that will serve as a model to the surrounding region of how we can create both economic and environmental vitality while simultaneously creating a stronger, more resilient community.

Agenda Item 17 - Discussion of format of Board minutes.

Ms. Morris explained that the format of Board minutes is discussed at Reorganization Meetings, especially when there are new members to the Board. The Board could ask that the minutes be verbatim, a summary, or a mix of the two. Public Comment, Public Hearings, or controversial items could be verbatim.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked if recordings of the minutes are accessible?

Ms. Morris confirmed that recordings are kept and are accessible.

Supervisor Yoder said that he has come in and listened to the recordings before.

Chairman Clinger said that he has looked at the minutes kept at the School Board, ours, and some other boards. I think ours are the most comprehensive minutes out there. Being that we are the top government I think it is imperative that we do have the most detailed because that

is the official record. We keep the recordings but they are not the official record, because they are not voted on. It is good to go back like Lauren does and listening gives you some clarity about what happened. I personally think that although it is more work on you all, I like the format we've had.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch agreed that if you record it and transcribe it, the more the minutes serve our constituents. They can read them as well as we have. Have the minutes as detailed as possible so there is no confusion.

The Board of Supervisors gave consensus to keeping the format of Board minutes the same as the previous year, not verbatim minutes but as detailed as possible regarding the business being conducted.

Agenda Item 18 - Discussion of LEAD Program and consideration of joining regional program.

Ms. Morris explained that LEAD stands for Leaders in Economic Alliance Development. It is basically a partnership planning program to accomplish a common goal. Ms. Morris said she attended a meeting recently that was facilitated by Dr. Walker with the Cooperative Extension and Mr. Lacey Moore with Rural Development. Some of the attendees were managers from the New River Valley and folks from the New River Regional Commission. The General Assembly, just a few years ago, through Rural Development, set up 7 SEA (Stronger Economies Together) regions through Virginia. Grants are available up to \$15,000 for regional projects. The focus in the last few years has been on regional projects. The grants can be used for different things like a regional forum, travel, printing. The purpose of the program is to organize regions into a group to create a program or project. We would have a public forum to assist with planning the project. Also on this team was staff from the Governor's Office, Virginia Tourism, Economic Development Partnership. As best as I can tell the only local commitment needed at this time is staffing. The project they suggested we start with has been in effect for a few years and is called "Renew the New." It is an event held in Giles County as a cleanup day and has had great success. Of course I made the point that the New River flows through all the participants' areas except Floyd County. Some of the spinoffs they talked about were having a cleanup day in each community. The only thing this is costing us right now is time. Ms. Morris said that if it is okay with the Board she is interested in continuing to meet to plan the Regional Forum. Ms. Morris suggested that Ms. Lydeana Martin and Ms. Pat Sharkey would also be good participants from Floyd County.

The Board of Supervisors gave consensus for Ms. Morris to continue participating in LEAD.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked if Ms. Morris and Board members were aware of the closing of Southwest Virginia Training Center and the Catawba Hospital? She asked if that had been discussed by the Board?

Ms. Morris replied in the affirmative.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked if any decisions had been made about formally adopting a position on it?

Ms. Morris replied that no resolution had been adopted regarding Catawba, but a resolution had been adopted regarding the Training Center. The resolution was sent to those involved in keeping it open and to the Governor.

Supervisor Yoder said that in addition to the resolution it was included in the Legislative Requests.

Other Board members corrected Supervisor Yoder and said that it had not been made part of the Legislative Requests.

Board members expressed the importance of keeping services in Southwest Virginia.

Ms. Morris offered to prepare a resolution seeking continued operation of the Catawba Hospital.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch said these institutions have not only employed people but helped our citizens.

Supervisor Turman said since he has been on the Community Services Board he has noticed, we fight to get all these mental health institutions and try to get help for mentally challenged people. The State mandates services, but they close the centers. It doesn't make a lot of sense.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch pointed out the decisions were made by the last administration and maybe there were ways to look at it as perhaps we don't do.

Chairman Clinger directed Ms. Morris to prepare a resolution regarding seeking continued operation of the Catawba Hospital to be considered at the next Board of Supervisors meeting.

Supervisor Yoder said he had an idea that he would like to present to the Board of Supervisors. The school system has a "Teacher of the Year" for the county. I have talked to Kevin Sowers about this a little bit. It would be good for our Board to interact more with volunteers at Fire and Rescue at more than just budget time. Would the County possibly consider doing something similar to what the school system is doing with "Teacher of the Year?" Fire and Rescue volunteers would be nominated to be recognized for service to the county.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked if it would just be Fire and Rescue or would we open it up to all volunteers?

Supervisor Yoder responded Fire and Rescue because they are funded by the County. They are providing a service that we would have to pay for if they weren't volunteering. This would be a small way to say thank you, to recognize them – a small pat on the back.

Ms. Morris pointed out that the school system does "Teacher of the Year" in conjunction with The Bank of Floyd.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch asked if it would be possible to get an underwriter for this idea?

Supervisor Yoder said maybe if there was money involved. But it would not be necessary if it were just a plaque. It just needs to be recognition of a job well done. It seems sometimes during budget time the only thing they hear from us is "no," so they might not feel appreciated by us. This would be a way of saying we recognize what you are doing for us and we appreciate what you are doing.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch expressed her agreement in this being an idea worth pursuing.

Chairman Clinger said we will have to develop a process with each squad preparing a nomination with the reasons why that volunteer is nominated. He expressed his support of the idea but we need to work on the structure of it.

Supervisor Yoder said he thought the process should be each station would nominate someone so there would be four nominees – one from each station. The criteria might be that you would be in the top 25% of the calls run for that station. The criteria would prevent it being a popularity contest. Other criteria could be exceptional service on a call.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch said it should help morale.

Supervisor Yoder wants the Board to interact with Fire and Rescue other than at budget time.

Chairman Clinger asked if there would be two separate awards – one for Fire and one for Rescue or one that encompassed both?

Supervisor Yoder preferred one for each type of service so the two services were not competing against each other.

Chairman Clinger agreed and said if it was combined and based on calls the Rescue volunteers receive many more calls.

Ms. Morris brought to the Board members attention that the \$25 county fee imposed for vehicles is waived for one vehicle owned by a Fire and Rescue member.

Supervisor Yoder added that you fill out a form each year and when you get your taxes you don't have that fee on your taxes.

Chairman Clinger asked Ms. Morris to research and put together a proposal for a program for the Board to consider. This does not need to be done by next week, but asked that Ms. Morris start looking into the process.

Supervisor Yoder suggested a committee of two Board members and Emergency Management Coordinator or a couple of community members to review the nominees and select the winner. Supervisor Yoder said if the decision was to offer a monetary reward, he would be willing to talk to community members to underwrite the reward. But he thinks the recognition itself would be meaningful. The recognition could be in the newspaper. Some of the people at the station I am with run 70 calls out of 90 calls in a year, almost 80% of the calls for that year. Some people have been performing this service for 40 years. It would be a nice way to say "thank you."

Supervisor Gerald asked how the audio system for the Board of Supervisors conference room was progressing?

Ms. Morris replied that she had a second quote for a system. The second quote was from Citizens Telephone Cooperative. She planned to present the two quotes at the next Board of Supervisors meeting.

Vice Chairman Turman said that he knew January was a busy month for every board trying to get established and organized. Therefore he suggested that about the first part of February a joint get together be held including members of the Board of Supervisors, the School Board and possibly Town Council. He said the format would be a sit down meet and greet. It would be a get-to-know-you type event. We don't have to discuss issues but we can hear each other's opinions. In the past there have been a lot of miscommunications. People think nobody wants to work with anybody else. The timing would be good especially because there are new members on the boards. This might help there be more cooperation between boards.

Ms. Morris asked if he envisioned this as more of a social activity or was he thinking about a program?

Supervisor Kuchenbuch suggested The Bank of Floyd community room might be a good location for it because it would be neutral. Everyone comes and sits down and talks and gets to know each other.

Ms. Morris said it sounds more like a social event.

Vice Chairman Turman confirmed Ms. Morris' understanding and said not a business thing.

Ms. Morris said that this would be a public meeting because more than three members would be present so it would have to be advertised in The Floyd Press.

Supervisor Yoder said he had been asked if there could be a joint meeting of all three governing bodies – Board of Supervisors, School Board, and Town Council – where you went into session and took Public Comments. After the meeting you could intermingle, but it wouldn't necessarily be a meeting. You could intermingle with the public and other board/council members but that part would not be a meeting.

Chairman Clinger confirmed that an actual joint meeting would require each to go into session and take minutes. Chairman Clinger said he would like to see it as joint meetings had been held before where they were a little more structured and where there was a two-way dialogue between them.

Supervisor Yoder expressed a preference for a formal meeting together with the other governing bodies, but after the meeting we're going to spend some time getting to know each other.

Chairman Clinger agreed we need to schedule a joint meeting early in the budget process where we discuss priorities. After the meeting we can hang around and talk and have coffee and snacks.

Consensus was reached that a joint meeting was a good idea and to continue the discussion as to the particulars at the January 12, 2016 Board of Supervisors meeting.

Hearing no other business Chairman Clinger called for a motion to adjourn.

Vice Chairman Turman made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Chairman Clinger called for a second on the motion.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch said she did have one other item to discuss.

Vice Chairman Turman rescinded his motion to adjourn.

Supervisor Kuchenbuch said in her first vote on the Board, no offense to Chairman Clinger, but she really wanted to see Supervisor Yoder as the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and she voted "yes" not thinking and then Supervisor Yoder voted "no." I realized I could have voted "no." I would like to go on record as voting "no" on the appointment of the Chairman position. I don't know if we can change that? I would like to at least express my opinion in the way I want to express my opinion. I would desire to do so if you would reopen the discussion.

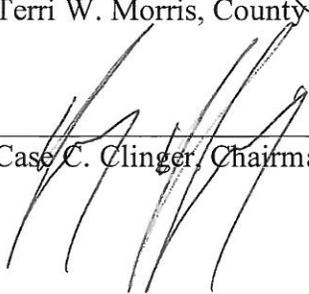
